Some definitions to describe homelessness

A person is considered homeless when:

Staying with family or friends as temporary housing.

Being evicted from a private dwelling unit (includes being evicted from a friend or family home), and has no subsequent residence: lacks resources / network needed to obtain housing.

Residing in places not meant for human habitation; such as cars, parks or abandoned buildings.
